Bethany Beach Appoints Patrick Foley Police Chief

BETHANY BEACH – The Bethany Beach Town Council voted unanimously to appoint Sergeant Patrick Foley as Police Chief at its Monday, April 15th meeting. Foley has been serving as the Town’s Officer in Charge since January.

Foley was initially hired for the BBPD in 2006 where he has since steadily progressed through the ranks. In his 18-year tenure he has served in many capacities while earning the respect of his fellow officers and the community that he serves.

Foley’s leadership skills emerged early on as a summer police officer where he was quickly promoted to Seasonal Supervisor. His comprehensive background in law enforcement and work ethic has given him the skill set to master the challenge of new roles from Public Information Officer and Community Relations Officer to Patrol Sergeant and CALEA Accreditation Manager. (Bethany is in the 5% of law enforcement agencies nationwide that is accredited by The Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). This coveted achievement is considered the “gold standard” in public safety.)

“I was surprised by the decision,” says Foley. “I really enjoy working for the Town and community. I’ve learned a lot in my time here so far and am looking forward to what lies ahead.”

Originally from Massachusetts, Foley lives in Delaware and is active in the Bethany Beach community with outreach events and initiatives. He has twice received the Chamber’s prestigious “Officer of the Year” award in 2007 and 2014.

DEMA (Delaware Emergency Management Agency) has created evacuation zones for the State. 

Bethany Plans Major Improvement to its Water Treatment Facility

The Town of Bethany Beach's Public Water Utility has delivered quality tap water to Bethany Beach residents for decades. Today, the Water Department delivers over 150,000,000 gallons of water to 3500 customers a year and on peak summer days produces over 1,200,000 gallons, per day.

Our tap water comes from 4 wells that draw from the Pocomoke-Ocean City aquifer and the Manokin aquifer. Fortunately, these are deep aquifers. Deep aquifers are far less susceptible to infiltration from man-made chemicals and bacteria. The Town's potable water is pumped from depths greater than 230 feet! Deep aquifers do have one negative however: water they produce often contain naturally occurring minerals like iron and magnesium, sometimes in large quantities.



In fact, iron is problematic in our aquifers and the first thing our water treatment facility does when water is pumped to the facility is remove iron. The plant uses a device called a clarifier that separates the iron from the water, allowing it to fall into a sump where it is pumped to a retention pond. In an average year, 90,000 gallons of iron sludge is pumped from this retention pond. The device that separates iron from our water is a critical piece of infrastructure.

The clarifier is reaching the end of its useful life (30+ years) and engineering used in its initial design is dated and impacts its effectiveness. The Town has asked its engineers to offer options and recommendations for the construction of a new clarifier and these options and recommendations were reviewed in a recent Town Council Workshop (April 15th, 2024).

Our engineers offered the Council four options to consider, and their recommendation creates needed redundancy in our treatment system by building a modern clarifier adjacent to the existing clarifier. The existing clarifier would then be used daily as a settling basin, and back-up as needed for the new clarifier when it is taken off-line. Since the clarifier is a critical component in creating potable water for our community, a redundant system is a significant improvement to our water treatment process.

The Town Council has not decided which option they will select at this time but will do so in the near future at a Public Meeting. Costs for improvements to the clarifier range from 1.4 million dollars to 2.4 million. The engineer's recommendation is estimated to cost 2 million dollars.

In conjunction with the Town Council's future decision regarding the clarifier, the Town is exploring how it will finance the clarifier improvement. The Town will be retiring existing debt on its new water tower in December 2025. We foresee being able to secure a new 20-year loan with an incredible 2.5% interest rate from a Revolving Fund the state maintains for improvements to municipal water systems. With planning those payments would begin in December of 2025. This would result in residents seeing no increase in fees or rates.

If the Town Council does decide to pursue a 20-year loan, approval for that loan will be brought to a voter referendum. The Town Charter requires a voter referendum for loans that indebted the Town for 20 years or more. That referendum would, in all likelihood, be synced to coincide with the Town's municipal election in September.

Bethany Beach Stormwater & Flood Committee Has Busy 2024



The Bethany Beach Stormwater & Flood Committee has had a busy and successful 2023/2024 and is looking at an information packed Fall. Our "Help the Town of Bethany Beach Fight Flooding" initiative with pamphlets and "A" frame signs spreading the word has gone quite well. Many of the pamphlets have been distributed with great feed back including surrounding community reach out reach out to use some of the information. Our fantastic committee team includes a member of the Center for the Inland Bays, a past and current consulting member of USACE, two wetlands and waterways surveyors, a past mayor and a past town council member.

Our meetings have updated our residents and those of surrounding communities on the numerous ongoing efforts of the Town as well as regional flood resilience efforts. They have included the proposed Loop Canal Flap Dam which has finally been proven by our engineers to prevent 95% of nuisance town flooding and that it will not adversely impact adjacent municipalities or unincorporated areas. This effort is now proceeding through the arduous and unfortunately lengthy permit process. Our Town's Assistant Town Manager, Terry Tieman's incredible grant efforts have landed the Town \$525K in federal and state grants toward the upcoming construction of Loop Canal bulkheads and a living shore line to reduce area erosion. The Town has contracted with the USGS to install ocean storm surge monitoring stations on the Loop and Assawoman Canals which can be viewed on the town website with "up to the minute" updates of flooding impact at any location around town.

We have hosted numerous area experts speaking on flood resilience topics including the April presentation by Asst Professor Ed Hale of the University of Delaware speaking on "Aquaculture and natural means of reducing erosion in the Back Bays". Rob Nicholson of UDel spoke on "the Blue Economy" and economic as well as robotic efforts to improve resilience and the marine environment. Danielle Swallow of Delaware Sea Grant spoke on "Flood Resilient Communities" There is of course much interest and many efforts in pursuing flood resilience through out Coastal Delaware.

The Fall of 2024 will bring more speakers to Town with a representatives of DNREC joining us to speak on a topic of interest to every Bethany home owner, FEMA Flood Insurance. A second DNREC speaker will cover the new DNREC "I-ADAPT " on line App which will provide customized preventative steps each home owner can take on your individual property to make your dwelling and lot the most resilient it can be. A very cool and free App.

Come join our meetings, all of which are open to the public and broadcast remotely through the town website. They are all well publicized thanks to our town events coordinator, Julie Malewski. We thank everyone who joined us during the 2023/24 off season and look forward to the fall.

Bethany Beach Farmers' Market Opening for 2024

The Bethany Beach Farmers' Market will open Sunday 6/2/24 for our 2024 and 18th season with our longstanding favorite vendors and some new additions. As always we are open from 8:00 am though noon on Sunday mornings through Labor Day Weekend in the PNC parking lot at the corner of Garfield Parkway and Pennsylvania Ave.. For everyone's convenience, there is always free parking in the gravel lot adjacent to the market. We are proud that our market is a non-profit, community-run, producers only market. Our invited vendors only sell products they grow, produce, or catch within 120 miles of Bethany Beach.

We have three fantastic new vendors joining us this season. Pereyra Farms from Newark, Maryland will feature a full spread of vegetables including melons, cantaloupes, corn, squash, tomatoes, cucumbers, as well as farm fresh eggs. Dittmar Family Farms offers a young family practicing natural regenerative agriculture from Felton, DE. They will bring a full range of greens through most if not all of the summer as well as other vegetables, beef and goat soap. Our third new vendor is Derby Mills Flower Farm from Dover. Two sisters run Derby Mill growing some of the best flowers and botanicals around, all varieties of flowers, herbs and light vegetables.

Of course we will have our returning regulars including Bennett Orchards with blueberries and peaches; mushrooms from Davidson's Exotic Mushrooms; Herbs, Spice & Everything Nice brings USDA certified organic vegetables and plants; Lavender Fields of Warrington has a full spread of lavender products; Old Word Bread brings their irresistible breads and pastries, Honey Bee brings her honey, jellies & jams and baked products; and Harry with Wimbrow Farms will be there with a full complement of vegetables.

Story Hill farm has exciting news, as they recently acquired Henlopen Salts. They had previously been producing the salts on their farm in Frankford for Henlopen Salts, but now they are Henlopen Salts. They of course still offer their incredible spread of pork and beef products, free range eggs and their wide variety of peanut butters.



They bring fresh Rehoboth Bay oysters, and crabs, crabcakes, salads, etc caught in Maryland and Virginia waters by a Cory Savage, a fifth generation crabber. They are picked and prepared by Jackie in their own Maryland licensed picking facility in Stockton, Maryland.

Telephone Reassurance Program


Are you OK? Is your family member OK?

Bethany Beach Adds Multiple New Acts to its 2024 Seaside Concerts

The 2024 Bethany Beach Seaside Concert Series will begin June 6th and continue through October 27th. Summer concerts will take place on Thursday nights in June, July, and August at 7:30. September and October shows will take place on Saturday and Sunday nights at 6:30. The Fourth of July week is an exception with nightly events Sunday through Thursday.

11 acts will be making their debut on the Bandstand. They will join an array of popular returning groups and crowd favorites. Audience polls show rock is still the number one requested genre, followed by tribute, then a tie for third between country and pop. The series will well represent these genres and support a broad demographic. “The audiences are accustomed to seeing show bands now,” says Events Director Julie Malewski. “They come to the Bandstand to appreciate the caliber of the talent, not just to listen to music.” The 2024 lineup will not disappoint.

The Dave Matthews Tribute Band is the only nationally touring tribute to DMB. The group will make a stop in Bethany on June 6th. The show delivers iconic sounds that DMB fans are drawn to such as high energy violin, jazzy saxophone, sparkling acoustic guitar, smooth bass, and explosive drumming. The following Thursday will feature ***Cellofest***, a culmination of a week of classical cello instruction hosted in Bethany Beach by The Cello Museum.

July introduces the biggest number of new acts to the lineup. This year’s Fourth of July parade and fireworks will take place on Thursday, July 4th. ***The 1974*** will provide the evening entertainment, playing those big ‘70s hits by those little ‘70s bands.

Kids/teen nights will once again take place each Wednesday in July. Carnival Night on July 3rd will feature the return of children’s entertainer ***Mr. Jon*** followed by variety entertainer, ***Boston Bachert***, who combines magic, juggling, circus arts, and more. ***Mr. Hetfield’s Rock and Roll Summer Camp*** will showcase this year’s new crop of young, local talent on July 31st.

July 11th features the unique stylings of the ***U.S. Army Six-String Soldiers***. This five-member group is the most followed military music group in the world and performs country, Americana, and bluegrass music with unique acoustic covers. The powerful rock show by ***7 Bridges: The Ultimate Eagles Experience*** will take place on July 18th. This group uses no backup tracks or harmonizers as they faithfully execute the Eagles sound and deliver the perfect blend of hits to capture all levels of Eagles fans. Michigan singer-songwriter Kanin Wren channels Swifties with her ***Taylor Swift Experience*** on July 25th. Wren’s show incorporates fun choreography and multiple costume changes while covering hits from Swift’s album anthology.

August 1st brings local band Decade80 who will appeal to the “Headband Nation” with anthems from that decade. Parrotbeach will pay homage to the late great Jimmy Buffett with a summer season finale on the Sunday of Labor Day weekend, September 1st.

Kenny Chesney fans will flock to No Shoes Nation Band on September 28th. Hailing from Boston, these 5 accomplished musicians pay tribute to country star Kenny Chesney whose showmanship and incredible catalog of Billboard hits sells out stadiums nationwide.

The Rock Orchestra returns for another year, but this time the gathering of Delaware Valley musicians will deliver note-for-note renditions of the Fleetwood Mac catalog on October 6th. All events are dependent upon weather and beach conditions. Summer movies will take place on Mondays on the beach off Garfield Parkway June 3rd through August 26th, and fall movies will be shown on Fridays on the Bandstand September 13th, 20th, and 27th all at dusk. Bonfires will take place in October.

- No tents, canopies, tarps, or cabanas. Standard upright umbrellas and baby tents (no larger than three (3') feet high by four (4') feet wide by five (5') feet long and without grounding wires or ropes that extend beyond the perimeter of the device) are allowed
- No smoking or vaping unless in a designated smoking area
- No ball playing, tossing objects, kites, or fishing during lifeguard hours
- No alcoholic beverages or glass containers
- No boats or vehicles on beach
- No dogs May 15 through September 30
- No fires
- No littering
- Beach closed to public from 1:00 am to 5:00 am daily
- No sleeping on beach from 10:00 pm to 8:00 am
- No digging large holes in sand
